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# Capital investment programme for the DHSSPS

#### Introduction

Expenditure plans for all government departments are set at three year intervals and based on the HM Treasury Comprehensive Spending Review (CSR). The CSR process allows for the planning and prioritising of funds and results in Public Service Agreements (PSA's) as part of the Programme for Government (PfG). The PSAs detail the targets or outcomes which it aims to achieve. This paper will present details of the current capital investment programme with the Department for Health, Social Services and Public safety (DHSSPS); in doing so this paper will look at:

- The Departments capital budget over the current CSR;
- The projects currently underway and their cost;
- The budget allocation in the investment strategy for Northern Ireland (ISNI) and the role of the Strategic Investment Board (SIB);
- The role of Private Financial Investment (PFI) and Public Private Partnership (PPP) arrangements in delivering projects within the DHSSPS; and
- Details on the future of the DHSSPS budget.

The current CSR covers the period 2008/09 to 2010/11. In the resulting programme for government which runs over the same period there were 23 Public Service Agreements. The PSA which relates to capital investment by the DHSSPS is PSA 16: Investing in Health and Education Estates; its aim is to: *"Take forward a programme of investment to provide a modern fit-for-purpose health and education estate in line with best practice and ensuring value for money"*<sup>1</sup>. In terms of capital investment in the Health Estate specifically, PSA 16 planned to create an "NI-wide network of modern, fit-for-purpose hospital facilities"<sup>2</sup>; an NI-wide network of primary care facilities; and improved emergency service (fire and ambulance) response times through capital investment in equipment<sup>3</sup>. Table 1 provides details of the objectives, actions, and targets related to PSA 16.

#### Budget

The CSR allowed for the allocation of capital funds for 2008 - 2011 in the PfG budget. The total budgeted for capital investment within the DHSSPS over this period was £728.5 million (see table 2).

The Northern Ireland Executives Investment Strategy for Northern Ireland 2008-2018 (ISNI) included this provision and provided details of how this would be divided across the three main areas, as identified in PSA 16. Furthermore, the ISNI provided indicative spending levels for the period of 2011-2018, bringing the total capital budget for the DHSSPS to over £3.6 billion<sup>5</sup> (see table 2) over the period, 2008-2018.

#### **Revised budget**

In light of significant changes to the public expenditure environment since the Budget 2008-11<sup>8</sup> there have been a series of cuts to the previously agreed budget. In a statement to the Assembly (01/10/2009) the Minister of Health, Social Services and

Public Safety (the Minister) stated that although £3.3 billion had been allocated [2008-2018] that this was against an estimated need of more than £7.8 billion. In addition the Minister stated:

"In the current CSR [2008-2011] I have received just over £700 million against a bid of £1 billion. £95 million of this was dependent on the sale of surplus assets, however, the economic downturn has rendered this sales target unachievable and my CSR budget has effectively been reduced by more than £50 million"<sup>9</sup>

The Minister went on to explain that further constraints had been placed on the department's resources due to the swine flu outbreak, which left him *"struggling to maintain the capital development programme"*<sup>10</sup>. These struggles are reflected in the department's revised budgets; in 09/10 the allocated capital budget was £184 million,<sup>11</sup> almost 40 million less than the figure set out in the original budget.

Projects which the Minister stated would be completed, despite the constraints were:

- The enhanced local hospital in Downpatrick, costing £64 million;
- The first phase of the Ulster hospital, costing £100 million;
- The regional adolescent psychiatric unit and family centre at forest green Hospital, costing £14 million;
- Health and care facilities in Castlreagh, Shankill Road, Beech Hall and Portadown; and
- The progression of the new critical-care building at the Royal Victoria Hospital<sup>12</sup>

The Minister in a written statement to the Assembly (19/02/2009) provided a comprehensive list of all the approved projects which the department was committed to in 2008-09 and 2009-10; this can be viewed in <u>annex 1</u>.

The NI Executive eventually published its revised spending plans for 2010-11 in April 2010. The net capital investment budget for DHSSPS has been reduced by 2.1% which represents £16.5 million<sup>13</sup>. In terms of savings, DHSSPS has the lowest percentage of all the Departments *"reflecting the priority afforded to health and social care services*".<sup>14</sup>

#### Strategic Investment Board (SIB)

The Investment Strategy for Northern Ireland (ISNI) is managed by the Strategic Investment Board (SIB) in conjunction with OFMDFM<sup>15</sup>. This provides an indicative 10-year funding envelope for DHSSPS (see table 2) and indeed, all other departments. All the departments have had the opportunity to contribute to the development of the ISNI, and the role of the SIB is to support them in delivering on it. The SIB is tasked by Ministers with three main roles:<sup>16</sup>

- to prepare and oversee the Investment Strategy for Northern Ireland (ISNI), the Executive's 10-year plan for infrastructure investment across the region, and advise Ministers on effective implementation;
- to support the procurement and delivery of major projects and programmes at the request of sponsoring departments in order to help accelerate delivery timetables and obtain better value for the taxpayer; and
- to **foster reform** in systems and processes across the public sector through investment in better infrastructure.

#### **Public Private Partnerships and Private Finance Initiatives**

Public private partnerships (PPPs) are arrangements typified by joint working between the public and private sector.<sup>17</sup> The rationale for the use of PPP is that it can attract investment which can support the delivery policies, service and infrastructure, ultimately providing Value for Money (VFM)<sup>18</sup>. According to Partnerships UK<sup>19</sup> there are currently 35 projects in Northern Ireland which involve either PPP or PFI; 12 of these projects, with a value of £127.69 million, are within the remit of the DHSSPS. A list of the current capital investment projects within the DHSSPS which use PPP or Private Finance Initiatives (PFI), which is the most widely used variant of PPP is provided in <u>annex 2</u>.

### Annex 1

The approved capital budgets for 2008/09 and 2009/10, including assumed income from asset sales, are £204m and £211m respectively. Within these amounts there are annual allocations for NIFRS, NIAS, ICT, Trust General Capital and UK-wide initiatives such as pandemic flu. In 2008/09 these allocations total approximately £70 million, which, when added to the projects detailed in the table below, show that the capital budget was fully committed in 2008/09.

Given that business cases for a number of planned schemes had not yet been approved, the table below includes only projects that are contractually committed in 2009/10<sup>20</sup>.
