Dear Elaine,

Further to your email dated 30 October 2015 to Hayley Barrett, RQIA, I write to provide further clarification as you requested regarding the number of admissions of young people to adult psychiatric wards in 2014 / 2015.

I can as requested clarify the wording quoted in my letter dated 23 October 2015 to Dr Aiken. By 'young people' I was referring to children under the age of 18 years at time of admission (Under 18's), and by 'last year' I was referring to the period of time between 01 April 2014 – 31 March 2015 (2014/15).

In your email you state that there are differences in the figures stated by DHSSPS to those provided to RQIA for the 2014/2015 year in respect of the age of young people compulsorily admitted to adult psychiatric wards .RQIA notes that the figures provided by DHSSPS indicate one admission of a young person under the age of 16 to an adult psychiatric ward.

I can confirm that in 2014/2015 RQIA received notification from both the Northern and Western Trust of an admission in their trust area, of a young person aged 15 years to an adult ward. Both these young people were detained under the Mental Health (Northern Ireland) Order 1986.

I attach in Appendix 1, a breakdown providing a comparison between RQIA and DHSSPS figures for young people detained in adult psychiatric wards in 2014/15. I also attach in Appendix 2, a breakdown of information requested by the DHSSPS on behalf of the committee in their email dated 20 October 2015 in respect of the number of detained young people on adult wards, length of stay on ward, and the reason provided to RQIA by the trust as to why they admitted a young person to an adult ward instead of a children's ward in 2014/2015.

I can confirm also that all of the information we hold in regard to the admissions of the 22 young people to adult psychiatric wards in 2014/15 was provided to RQIA by the five trusts in accordance with the guidance issued by DHSSPS, and treated as a untoward incident. RQIA can also confirm that in nine of these 22 admissions, RQIA received copies of the prescribed forms in accordance with the statutory requirements of trusts under the Mental Health Order (Northern Ireland) 1986.
