Agriculture and Rural Development Committee Inquiry into Better Regulation Factual Briefing provided by Department of Enterprise, Trade & Investment

The Agriculture and Rural Development Committee is undertaking an inquiry into Better Regulation, with a particular focus on farmers. DETI has been asked to submit evidence to this inquiry.

Background to Review of Business Red Tape

- This was an action contained in the Economic Pact, between the UK Government and Northern Ireland Executive, announced in June 2013;
- The DETI Minister commissioned Review of Business Red Tape, establishing an Advisory Panel and putting in place a Review Team, in December 2013;
- Review focused on three high level regulatory areas:
 - Regulatory Framework in Northern Ireland;
 - Regulations and potential disproportionate burden; and
 - Delivery / Implementation of Regulation.
- The Review was tasked with putting forward recommendations for the NI Executive to consider as the basis for a longer term programme of actions to address key issues, which would deliver a step change in the regulatory landscape in NI and support economic and business growth while protecting society and the environment.
- The Review progressed 4 key work strands:
 - Assessing the applicability of UK better regulation policies in NI;
 - Improvements to regulatory delivery in Northern Ireland;
 - Improvements to communication and information for the benefit of businesses and across Regulators; and
 - Consider an NI approach to 'Better Regulation', taking account of the UK Government's flagship initiatives – Red Tape Challenge and Focus on Enforcement;
- There was wide ranging engagement across all stakeholder groups involved or impacted by regulatory activity throughout the Review;

Current Position

- A report was produced and presented to the then Enterprise, Trade & Investment Minister, Arlene Foster, in November 2014;
- Six high level recommendations were put forward, supported by additional 38 recommendations;


- The report is available for download on the DETI website www.detini.gov.uk/betterregulation;
- Following receipt of the Report, the Minister shared it with Executive colleagues and the ETI Committee. She also requested that a senior officials inter departmental group be established to consider the recommendations and develop a draft response for Executive consideration;
- The Inter Departmental group has met a number of times, supplemented with a series of bi-lateral meetings with DETI officials;
- Wider issues of budget, Voluntary Exit Scheme and public sector reform have all been taken into account during this process;
- The process of developing a series of regulatory reform actions which officials and Ministers can support is continuing;
- The Review Team developed a sectoral review model to pilot in NI based on the UK Government's Red Tape Challenge and Focus on Enforcement initiatives. Three pilots were initiated – Hospitality Sector, Construction Sector and the Agri-food Sector and are still ongoing;

Agri-Food Sector Pilot Review

- Attached at annex A is a visual of the sector model being piloted which forms the basis of the intended approach for the pilot with the Agri-food sector;
- A small working group consisting of a number of representative bodies from the wider Agri-food sector has met to consider the regulatory burden on this sector and to identify potential areas for more in-depth consideration as part of this pilot;
- DETI is facilitating this group and providing advice and guidance as necessary;
- It was agreed that designing an industry survey for completion by the sector, would be useful to better understand the regulatory concerns of businesses. Attached at annex B is a list of the questions asked in this survey;
- Responses will be analysed by the working group at a meeting later in October. This will help to further understand the regulatory issues faced by businesses in the sector.

Regulatory Reform: Industry survey for Agri-food pilot

Red Tape Review of Agri-food sector Regulation

As you will be aware, the Agri-Food Strategy Board published the Going for Growth Strategy in May 2013 to support the development of the agri-food industry in NI. As part of this strategy recommendations were made on the subject of Better Regulation, in order to ensure that levels of Red Tape are appropriate.

You may also be aware that DETI commissioned a Review of Business Red Tape in 2013 and a report was submitted to the DETI Minister in late 2014. A key aspect of the work of this particular review was to devise and test a model to undertake specific regulatory issue reviews within individual sectors, whereby each sector would identify issues of excessive red tape, gather evidence from businesses experiencing a disproportionate burden and suggest how the burden could be lessened.

Following initial scoping with a small group of industry representatives, it was decided that an initial pilot would be most effective in the agri-food sector if focussed on the experience of processors.

Whilst this review is primarily concerned with statutory regulation, our stakeholder feedback has made clear there is also a significant burden of "regulation schemes" within the industry. This survey will include these interactions and findings will be communicated to industry bodies for further action.

Due to the recent public sector reform and the transfer of some planning functions to local government, this review will not include planning.

We would like to hear your experiences of dealing with a range of regulators.


