- 2. The process of Formal Intervention in itself can be very damaging to any educational Institution and therefore makes the task of getting out of this situation doubly difficult as the morale of the whole school community is affected, i.e all staff, all pupils, all parents and the whole community the school serves. Recovery from Formal intervention makes the process of improvement almost impossible due to the affect on morale to the whole school community. While it is vital that all schools seek to provide an excellent education for all pupils the current process of Formal Intervention with the implication that all aspects of the school is inadequate may not be the most productive or efficient method of improvement for a school or any educational establishment. We feel that the process of Intervention should be looked at so that schools can make a recovery more quickly. We feel that there must be better ways to effect improvement without the public humiliation of all staff, pupils and the whole community.
