Since its inception in 2009, Libraries NI has undertaken a number of public consultations and each time respondents have emphasised that the library is a shared space – in some areas the only shared community facility – and that it contributes to community cohesion. This is confirmed by the results of the Northern Ireland Life & Times Survey and this indicator. This is welcome.

General Comments on the Outcomes-based Approach to the Programme for Government	Libraries NI is supportive of the outcomes-based approach and the emphasis on conditions of wellbeing for individuals and society as a whole; the focus on impact on people; the commitment to working across government and breaking down silos; and the recognition given to the importance of partnership and collaboration in both the design and delivery of the actions necessary to realise the aspirations in the draft Programme for Government.
