COMMITTEE MEETING 10 NOVEMBER 2015

<u>Increasing the Maximum Penalties for Offences Committed Under the Welfare of Animals Act 2011</u>

The Department has noted the Committee's request that it should consider banning the keeping of animals on land owned by individuals who have been convicted of an offence under the Welfare of Animals Act 2011 and will give the issue consideration as part of the Review into the Implementation of the legislation.

Prosecution Statistics - DARD VS/Councils/PSNI

Members will be aware that the focus of the Welfare of Animals Act 2011 is to protect animals and prevent suffering. It introduced a duty of care in respect of all protected animals and provided new enforcement powers to allow action to be taken to prevent animals from suffering. As officials explained, when they presented to the Committee on 10th November, prosecution is only one method available to enforce the Welfare of Animals (NI) Act 2011.

For example Councils received **16,769** animal welfare calls, which have resulted in **25,962** inspections. Depending on the nature of any welfare issues, Council Animal Welfare Officers can provide advice, issue Improvement Notices or instigate prosecution action.

716 legally binding Improvement Notices have been issued by Councils. Improvement Notices specify the nature of non-compliance with the legislation, the remedial action required to achieve compliance and the time allowed to complete the required work. Non-compliance with Improvement Notices is an offence, the penalty for which is currently imprisonment for up to six months and a fine of up to £5,000.



DARD Veterinary Service carries out between **700** and **1,000** animal welfare inspections annually. Any non-compliance detected may result in enforcement action. Like Councils, this action may be through an Improvement Notice which specifies the nature of the non-compliance, the remedial action required and the time allowed for the action to be completed. On-farm follow up inspections are undertaken to ensure the issues have been satisfactorily resolved.

The table below includes figures for *Prosecutions*, *Convictions* and *Prison Sentences* imposed following cases taken by each of the animal welfare enforcement bodies in the period 2nd April 2012 to 11th November 2015, unless otherwise stated.

The Ongoing Cases column details cases that the enforcement body has referred to their legal services and/or the PPS. It cannot be confirmed at this stage whether or not these cases will proceed to prosecution.
