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Welfare Changes in Northern Ireland: Key Resources for Constituency Casework

1 Where can I find information on the changes?

Two of the most significant changes to social security benefits in Northern Ireland are the introduction of Universal Credit and Personal Independence Payment. Further information on these new benefits as well as information on changes to other benefits can be found on the NI Direct website:

It is also important to be aware that changes have also been introduced to Child Tax Credit (CTC). From 6 April 2017, people in Northern Ireland will not be able to claim Child Tax Credit for third or subsequent children or qualifying young person born on or after 6 April 2017 (there are a limited range of exceptions). This change also applies to Universal Credit. Further information is available at:

2 Where can I find information on the mitigation measures and supplementary payments?

There are significant differences to the implementation of welfare reform in Northern Ireland in comparison to Great Britain. The *Fresh Start Agreement* (www.communitiesni.gov.uk/articles/department-communities-implementation-its-fresh-start-agreementcommitments) set out the Northern Ireland Executive's agreement to provide funds to 'top up' the UK welfare arrangements in Northern Ireland. The Executive further agreed that a working group, led by Eileen Evason, would develop a mitigation scheme to assist vulnerable people in Northern Ireland from the immediate impact of welfare reform. 3 How can I help my constituents?

This section provides links to information that are perhaps the most recurrent issues for constituents, i.e. challenging a benefit decision (through Mandatory Reconsideration and appeals); benefit sanctions and appealing those sanctions; financial support; budgeting and debt advice; and organisations that can provide assistance.

Mandatory Reconsideration

If a constituent believes that a decision about their social security benefits is wrong, they can ask the office that made the decision to explain it. This is known as 'mandatory reconsideration'. Should a person wish to appeal a social security decision following the outcome of Mandatory Reconsideration they must send their appeal directly to the Appeals Service (TAS).
