

Briefing for New Stormont Executive and Assembly 2011

The Northern Ireland Fuel Poverty Coalition

The Northern Ireland Fuel Poverty Coalition was launched on the 1st November 2010 in response to the increasing serious levels of fuel poverty in Northern Ireland. The Coalition's aim is to drive forward the fuel poverty agenda in Northern Ireland in terms of both policy and practical initiatives.

Currently, the Coalition has a membership base of over 100 organisations from across Northern Ireland; representing businesses, environmental groups, trade unions, the health sector, local councils, consumer groups, housing associations, rural support networks, the voluntary sector, student unions, young persons groups, older persons groups and faith groups.

Fuel Poverty in Northern Ireland

Fuel Poverty in Northern Ireland is driven by a number of factors – high energy prices, low income and household energy efficiency levels. Academic and medical research clearly shows that living in a cold home can damage quality of life and health, leading to wider costs on the community. The latest official figures¹ show that in 2009, 44 per cent² of households (302,000) in Northern Ireland were in fuel poverty - this is three times as high as the level in England, and nearly double the rate in both Scotland and Wales.

Consumers in Northern Ireland face significantly higher energy bills than elsewhere in the UK – spending on £348 more per year on average. The majority of households in Northern Ireland rely on home heating oil to heat their homes (68 per cent of homes overall and 82 per cent in rural areas), and its increasingly price remains a serious issue for many fuel poor households. Over the recent winter period heating oil prices for a 900 litre fill fluctuated by £161 (or 40 per cent). In addition, some households using natural gas have recently experienced increases of 39.1 per cent³, and it is expected that electricity prices will also increase in the autumn.

Current Northern Ireland Executive Fuel Poverty Strategy

In March 2011, the Department for Social Development launched a new fuel poverty strategy for Northern Ireland. The Strategy commits itself to a society where fuel poverty is eradicated and everyone can live in a home which is free of cold and damp, but the strategy provides <u>no</u> targets or roadmaps on how this will be achieved.

The New Assembly Term.

The new Assembly term is crucial to ensuring a successful and sustainable response to the fuel poverty crisis that Northern Ireland is experiencing. It is essential that fuel poverty is comprehensively tackled in the short to medium term before energy becomes simply unaffordable for the most vulnerable households in our society.

The Northern Ireland Fuel Poverty Coalition therefore is calling on the newly formed Stormont Executive to support:

- The development of a detailed and costed action-plan setting out how and when fuel poverty will be eradicated in Northern Ireland.
- The provision of support to all fuel poor households to stay warm until fuel poverty is eradicated.

In addition, the Coalition is proposing that the new Executive:

- 1. Establish a Cross Departmental Ministerial Fuel Poverty Task Force with a duty to eradicate Fuel Poverty in Northern Ireland. The new Programme for Government should commit all Government Ministers to incorporate action plans on Fuel Poverty within their Department's overall strategic plans.
- 2. Examine whether regulation of the oil industry could provide consumers with the necessary confidence that they are paying a fair price for oil and provide fuel poor households with the support and safeguards that natural gas and electricity consumers currently have.
- 3. Implement a targeted area based insulation retrofitting programme to improve the energy efficiency levels of all households in Fuel Poverty.
- 4. Develop and encourage energy brokering schemes and implement a system to help make energy bills of all low income households more affordable.
- 5. Ensure that people eligible for existing benefits claim them, and create a package of advice and support that is available to people in Fuel Poverty.
- 6. Extend the Winter Fuel Payment to other vulnerable groups, to include children and young people and those with long term health conditions.
- 7. Develop a database which clearly identifies who is in fuel poverty so that targeted support can be provided.
