Review of access to palliative care services - Organisations/Health professionals

Coordination and Integration: Explore the level of coordination between different healthcare providers and the integration of palliative care with other health services.

Challenges and Barriers: Identify the main challenges and barriers faced by hospices and palliative care providers, including financial, operational and regulatory issues. Future Needs. Assess future needs and demands for palliative care services in light of demographic changes and emerging healthcare trends.

Support for patients and families: Assess what level of support is currently provided, looking at the journey of a patient and family through end-of-life care.
