Memorandum of Reply (MoR) –Public Procurement in Northern Ireland

Further to my letter of 25 June 2025, which provided the Committee with an update on progress of the targets outlined in the MoR on your report on Public Procurement NI, I wanted to update the Committee on the response to Recommendation 3 below:

‘The Committee recommends that the Department undertakes an urgent review to determine the most appropriate governance and oversight structures to be put in place to support strong leadership and decision making and to allow system-wide oversight of performance against the new strategy’s priorities’.

In my correspondence, I advised that, for Recommendation 3, the target implementation date of 31 December 2025 would not be achieved and that the likely completion date for the Review would be 31 March 2026. As the target implementation date has been extended, I wanted to update the Committee on the current status of this important commitment. A copy of the Terms of Reference for the Expert Panel is attached at Annex A and includes details of the panel members who will commence their work on 20 October 2025. We plan to have the final report and recommendations developed by the end of January 2026, and it is hoped that Executive approval of the panel’s recommendations can be achieved before the end of March 2026. This will allow the new governance arrangements to be implemented at the start of the next financial year.

In terms of an update on Recommendations 7 and 8, I am pleased to advise the [Public Procurement Policy Stakeholder Engagement Strategy](#) and [Public Procurement Supplier Communication Strategy](#) were published on the Department’s website on 8 July 2025. The strategies were developed by Centres of Procurement

Expertise in consultation with Intertrade Ireland, InvestNI and other external stakeholders (including the Federation of Small Businesses, Social Enterprise NI, NI Council for Voluntary Action) and provide a strong platform for effective and transparent engagement and communications with all stakeholders.

In addition, I can confirm that the Permanent Secretaries with responsibility for Centres of Procurement Expertise have approved the [Procurement Performance Metrics](#) and a [Public Procurement Capacity and Capability Strategy](#). The publication of these documents complete recommendations 2, 5 and 10 of the Committee's report on Public Procurement.

For completeness, I have attached an update on the actions within the MoR at Annex B which are listed in order of their target implementation date.

Memorandum of Reply (MoR) –Major Capital Projects Follow Up Report

Thank you for your letter dated 19 September 2025 regarding the MoR for the Major Capital Projects Follow Up Report which has yet to be laid before the Assembly.

My Minister and I share the Committee's frustration that it has not been possible for the draft MoR to be brought to the Executive for its approval.

Out of the 12 recommendations within the report, implementation of 9 of these rely on the governance arrangements established under the draft Investment Strategy NI which has not been brought before the Executive for approval.

The Finance Minister wrote to the office of the First Minister (FM) and Deputy First Minister (dFM) on 3 July 2025 stating that it was imperative that the Executive now considers and agrees an Investment Strategy to allow the MoR to progress. To date, a response has not been received.

Whilst the absence of an approved Investment Strategy NI is impacting on the approval of the MoR, I can assure the Committee that, where it is possible, progress continues to be made on the 12 Enabling Actions agreed by the NICS Board in May 2024. The Committee was provided with a progress report on the Enabling Actions on 1 July 2025.

I understand the Committee's concern that the eight-week deadline for laying the MoR has been exceeded, however, given the delivery of major capital projects sits across a number of other departments and Arm's Length Bodies, and the MoR required NICS Board and Executive approval, the 8-week timescale was not sufficient to draft and seek approval for the required response. The Committee clerk was kept advised of this position.

My understanding is that while the Audit guidance says that the response should be published within eight weeks, there are occasions when that is not possible. I am advised that these cases are dealt with on a case-by-case basis and regular contact is maintained with the Committee Clerk to advise them of the delay.

I have raised this with the Treasury Officer of Accounts who is considering if this guidance should be amended to reflect the time required for the drafting and approval process of responses which are cross cutting.

Your letter asks for a copy of the Board Effectiveness Review. The Review was on the Agenda for discussion at the NICS Board on 30 September 2025 and it was agreed that the action plan should be finalised and sent to the Committee with the report by the end of October 2025.

While the draft ISNI remains under policy consideration, there is no further clarification around the delays to the MoR that I can add, and as the draft MoR is with the Finance Minister and has yet to receive Executive approval, there is limited detail I can provide on the content of the response. However, I am happy to attend the Committee with support from officials and the Strategic Investment Board to discuss progress on the Enabling Actions if the Committee would find this helpful.
