**REQUEST FROM: FINANCE COMMITTEE – DALO READOUT - MEETING
WEDNESDAY 6 MAY 2026**

Point 4 – Economy Committee: Petroleum Exploration and Licensing (Repeal) Bill: The Committee would ask the Department to consider this Bill and indicate if it has any remit or if there is any relevant policy locus within the Bill’s provisions. This will inform a response to the Economy Committee.

Response –

- The Petroleum Exploration and Licensing (Repeal) Bill was agreed by the Executive on 26 February 2026 and subsequently introduced to the Assembly on 13 April 2026.
- This followed Executive agreement in December 2024 to introduce a temporary moratorium on all forms of onshore petroleum exploration and production. This approach prevented emissions from onshore petroleum and signalled a commitment to the greenhouse gas emissions reduction targets as set out in the Climate Change Act NI (2022).
- Independent research, public consultation and assessment of economic, environmental and social impacts concluded that petroleum development would not deliver meaningful economic benefit and would carry significant potential environmental and community impacts.
- In terms of financial implications, the Bill will not place any additional financial burden on the public purse, businesses or the third sector.
- This Bill will introduce a ban on all forms of onshore petroleum exploration and production in the North and will help the wider Executive to deliver against the Climate Change Act NI (2022) emission targets and the objectives outlined in the Executive’s Energy Strategy.
- The Department of Finance has no direct policy remit in relation to the provisions of the Petroleum Exploration and Licensing (Repeal) Bill. However, it has an indirect interest in terms of wider economic considerations and alignment with Executive priorities, including climate and energy policy.

Dear Peter,

1. Thank you for your memo of 1 May 2026 seeking the views of Statutory Committees on the Petroleum Exploration and Licensing (Repeal) Bill.
2. The Committee for Communities has considered the matter and confirms a Nil Return. The reasoning supporting that position is set out below.
3. In reaching its position, the Committee for Communities considered the Bill as introduced, the accompanying Explanatory and Financial Memorandum (EFM), the oral evidence provided by Department for the Economy officials to the Committee for the Economy on 25 March 2026, and the Official Report of the Bill's Second Stage debate on 27 April 2026.
4. The Committee has examined whether any aspect of the Bill engages the statutory responsibilities of the Department for Communities (DfC). No such intersection has been identified.
5. The Committee notes the references made by several Members at Second Stage to just transition principles.
6. The Committee acknowledges that future decarbonisation policy and legislation may give rise to just transition considerations of interest to the Department for

Communities. The Committee observes, however, that those considerations do not arise in respect of this Bill, there being no industry, no workforce and no live licensee whose transition is to be supported or managed in consequence of its passage.
