

EXPLANATORY MEMORANDUM TO

The Public Health (Notifiable Diseases - Hantavirus Diseases) Order (Northern Ireland) 2026

S.R. 2026 No.

Introduction

This Explanatory Memorandum has been prepared by the Department of Health to accompany the Statutory Rule (details above) which is laid before the Northern Ireland Assembly.

The Statutory Rule is made under Section 1 (2) of the Public Health Act (Northern Ireland) 1967 and is subject to the negative resolution procedure.

Purpose

To make hantavirus diseases (including hantavirus pulmonary or cardio-pulmonary syndrome (HCPS) and haemorrhagic fever with renal syndrome (HFRS)) notifiable diseases so that medical practitioners will be required to share patient information with the Public Health Agency if they become aware, or have reasonable grounds, for suspecting that a person they are attending has a hantavirus disease.

Background

On 3rd May 2026 the UK Health Security Agency (UKHSA) declared an Enhanced Level response for a Hantavirus incident following an outbreak of a hantavirus disease on board a cruise ship in the Atlantic which was carrying passengers and crew representing 23 nationalities, including passengers and crew from the United Kingdom and the Republic of Ireland. Passengers and crew who tested negative for a hantavirus disease were repatriated to their home countries to self-isolate. Given the incubation period (up to 8 weeks) further outbreaks are expected. In order to make hantavirus diseases notifiable diseases, it is necessary to make a Statutory Rule.

The addition of hantavirus diseases as notifiable diseases would place a statutory duty on registered medical practitioners to notify the Public Health Agency (PHA) where they become aware of, or have reasonable grounds for suspecting, that a person has a hantavirus disease. The provision of this information will be essential in enabling the PHA to identify confirmed or suspected cases of a hantavirus disease, ensure the Health and Social Care system can respond, and enable surveillance and tracking of the spread and epidemiology of the disease.

The inclusion of hantavirus diseases on the list of notifiable diseases reflects the seriousness of the current outbreak and provides the necessary legislative framework to protect public health.

Parity or Replicatory Measure

The Health Protection (Notification) (Amendment) Regulations 2026 were laid on 18 May 2026 to include hantavirus disease (including hantavirus pulmonary or cardiopulmonary syndrome (HCPS) and haemorrhagic fever with renal syndrome(HFRS)) as a notifiable disease in England. Wales and Scotland do not intend to make similar amendments. The Republic of Ireland has indicated that it intends to make hantavirus disease notifiable.
