1. What is the current status of Research on Teenage Pregnancy?


Research and policy priority in many western countries for over three decades:

- 1. Research which measures the incidence
- 2. Research which explores risk factors for adolescent pregnancy
- 3. Research which explores impact of adolescent pregnancy

Teenage Birth Rates are Higher in More Unequal Rich Countries

2. Why Focus on Teenage Men?

- Targeting teen boys is an important, yet neglected part of addressing teenage pregnancy.
- Teen boys less likely to receive RSE and less likely to receive parental advice.



2. Why Focus on Teenage Men?



- Woman's right to choose, but male partners influence how women define and cope with an unintended pregnancy.
- Addressing sexual health is an important strategy for promoting positive development and mental health (Sexual Health Promotion Strategy, NI)
- Critical time to reach out with young men



3. Movie-based Approach

Method: a computer based interactive video drama (IVD)

- Brings to life a story...
- Participants have to role play
- Potential as an educational intervention



3. Movie-based Approach



The key educational aim of the educational resource is to increase young people's (boys and girls) intention to avoid a teenage pregnancy by:

- raising awareness among young men as well as young women about the potential consequences of an unintended pregnancy in their lives; and
- increasing young people's self-efficacy in communicating about unintended pregnancy.

3. Movie-based Approach

Materials

- IVD & classroom educational materials to assist teachers & homework exercise with parents
- A training package for teacher trainers
- Information letter & webbased educational material for parents

Non-Directional

Designed to be flexible to fit in with School Ethos/

Personal Development Policy

Opens up issues but is nondirective and facilitates school ,pupil & parental contributions

4. What is the evidence for this approach?

- Acknowledge that teenage pregnancy is a complex social problem but RSE is an essential component
- 1. the importance of a theoretically based sexual health education programme targeting (TPB + acknowledging wider socio-environmental factors)
- 2. Targeted to meet participants' needs and social context (in order to be able to personalise messages


4. What is the evidence for this approach?

- 3. Incorporate behavioural skills and training: Constructivist ideas of education delivery
- 4. Promotion of heterosocial interaction in a safe place and practicing of 'verbal scripts' for current & future relationships.
- 5. Programmes that reach beyond classroom (parents)
- 6. Engage with young people emphatically and cognitively (Is it an enjoyable lesson?)
