


Figure 3.1. Looked After Children in Northern Ireland at 31 March (1995 – 2014)

Strains on the Looked After System

- Increasing numbers of looked after children
- Delays in admission to care
- Delays in the court process





Early Authoritative Intervention

- Parent's ability to change
- Parent's willingness to engage
- The durability of any changes
- The accessibility of services
- The availability of family support services in the longer term







Children and Families Act 2014

- Introducing a time limit of 26 weeks when courts are considering whether a child should be taken into care for all except 'exceptional cases'
- Promoting 'fostering for adoption' so that children are placed sooner with the families that are able to adopt them
- Limiting the use of expert evidence to that which is necessary to assist the court to resolve proceedings justly
- Restricting judicial oversight of the care plan for the child



Significant Legal Judgements

- Re B (Care Proceedings: Appeal (2013) UKSC 33 2013 2FLR 1075)
- Re B-S (Adoption: Application of s 47 (5) 2013 EWCA Civ 1146 2014 1 FLR 1035)
- European Court of Human Rights (YC v United Kingdom (2012) 55 EHRR, 967)
