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Northern Ireland University Budgets

1 Introduction

The following paper was requested by the Committee for Employment and Learning in order to provide details on the budgets for Northern Ireland's Universities - Queen's University Belfast (QUB); University of Ulster (UU); St. Mary's University College; and Stranmillis University College.

2 Background

Higher Education (HE) across the UK is undergoing a large number of changes as a result of the on-going financial difficulties created by the 2008 recession and UK Government policies which intend to apply market forces to the Higher Education sector.

Following the Comprehensive Spending Review and the publication of the revised Northern Ireland government budget, the Department for Employment and Learning (DEL) made a large number of cuts across its portfolio, with a large percentage of these cuts focused on the Higher Education sector.

Tables 1 and 2 show DEL's budget for 2010-2015, including current and capital expenditure.

As can be seen in table 1 above current expenditure for Higher Education falls significantly from 2010-11 to 2014-15, with a drop of £55.7 million in the five year period.

The cuts in the Higher Education Budget are expected to be met in two ways, with £28 million of efficiency savings and remaining £40 million expected to be met through the introduction of higher tuition fees for students.

In a letter provided to RalSe by the Minister for Employment and Learning, it is stated that:

It should be emphasised that the £28 million is a cash reduction to the Higher Education sector budgets, and in addition to this the Universities will have to find the resources themselves to cover pay and price movements, superannuation, ERNIC, VAT and other inflationary pressures. This explains the real term 22% operational efficiency savings³.

Table 3 provides Higher Education Statistics Agency (HESA) data on the recurrent income of NI Higher Education Institutions (HEIs) since 2005. The funding council grant reflects income provided by the government and includes teaching and research grants.

As can be seen in Table 3, direct government funding through the council grant for 2008/09 provides 41.8% of the income received by the HEI's. Indirect Government funding is provided through tuition fees (by way of the Student Loans Company). For 2008/09 funding council grants and tuition fees provided 63.6% of HEI funding in comparison to 58.5% in 2005/06.

3 Queen's University Belfast

Table 4 below shows the QUB recurrent grant for the academic years 2010-11 and 2011-12⁵.

QUB will have a reduction in its recurrent grant of 7.62%, with large percentage cuts in areas such as research funding (10.09%) and additional funded places becoming a cost to the University of £86,171.

It should also be noted that Widening Participation and students with Disabilities take a significant reduction in funding of 15.35%, a cash sum of £98,922.

4 University of Ulster

The University of Ulster takes a slightly smaller budget reduction than QUB, with an overall drop in recurrent grant funding of 7.16%. The largest reduction in spend is in research with a fall of 12.7%. As with QUB, a large part of this reduction is as a result of the cutting of the Sustainable Research Fund for the year. The Charities support element also takes a significant cut of 22.21%.

St. Mary's has a 6% reduction in its year on year budget, with no change in Widening Access.

6 Stranmillis University College

Table 7 details the recurrent grant funding for Stranmillis for academic years 2010-11 and 2011-128.

As with St. Mary's, Stranmillis has a 6% reduction in its budget. The reductions are spread evenly across the various budget items, with Widening Access continuing to receive funding.
