1 Introduction

The <u>2025 Spring Statement</u> set out plans for what the UK Government <u>describes</u> as the 'biggest shake up to welfare system in a generation'. At the centre of these reforms is the Department for Work and Pensions Green Paper, <u>Pathways to Work: Reforming Benefits and Support to Get Britain Working</u>, which outlines proposals for significant changes to Personal Independence Payment (PIP) and the health element of Universal Credit.

The UK Government's reform proposals have drawn particular concern in Northern Ireland due to the higher uptake of disability benefits here and the impact on claimants (including those who are in work) and carers. Given that social security is devolved, the application of the UK Government's proposals in Northern Ireland will be determined by the Northern Ireland Executive and Assembly.

This Topical Digest provides a reading list on the issues surrounding the welfare reforms set out in the Spring Statement 2025. It includes a range of sources from the UK Government, House of Commons and Northern Ireland Assembly, in addition to reactions and responses from UK think tanks, UK and Northern Ireland organisations and other media articles.
