Topical Digest

The Online Safety Act 2023

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This topical digest provides a reading list to assist in understanding and scrutinising the Online Safety Act 2023. 1 Introduction

The <u>Online Safety Act 2023</u> establishes a new regulatory regime with the intention of addressing illegal and harmful content online. It imposes legal requirements on the following¹:

- Providers of internet services which allow users to encounter content generated, uploaded or shared by other users ('user-to-user services');
- Providers of search engines which enable users to search multiple websites and databases ('search services'); and
- Providers of internet services on which provider pornographic content (pornographic content that is published by a provider and is not user-generated) is published or displayed.

The Act also confers new powers on the Office of Communications (OFCOM), establishing them as the online safety regulator. This role includes overseeing and enforcing the new regulatory regime, as well as producing various sets of guidance and codes of practice which have been consulted on and then published throughout 2024 and 2025, continuing into 2026.

Key milestones in this process have been the enforcement of child safety duties from 25 July 2025. By this date, services likely to be accessed by children are required to have completed a 'suitable and sufficient' children's risk assessment and to have implemented required safety measures, including age verification to prevent children from accessing pornography, or content which encourages self-harm, suicide or eating disorder content.

One of the major developments which is still awaited (as of the date of this Topical Digest) is the publication of final guidance on protecting women and girls online. This guidance is expected to be published by the end of 2025.

Some stakeholders have continued to campaign for changes to the Online Safety Act, including on issues such as whether the Act overly restricts freedom of expression, whether age verification systems present a risk to the privacy of individuals, a perceived lack of clarity on what constitutes harmful content, and whether enforcement measures where providers of online platforms transgress are proving effective. Some organisations have proposed that the emerging threat of so-called 'deepfake' images, or sexual digital forgery, also now needs to be addressed more specifically in legislation in Northern Ireland.
